Open from 1 - 28 February for pupils in Y3-11, it will help develop a better understanding of young people's online lives, nationally, via an academic report we have commissioned, and locally, through the data which will be returned to participating schools.

Life in “likes” – Children’s Commissioner report into Social Media use among 8-12-year olds

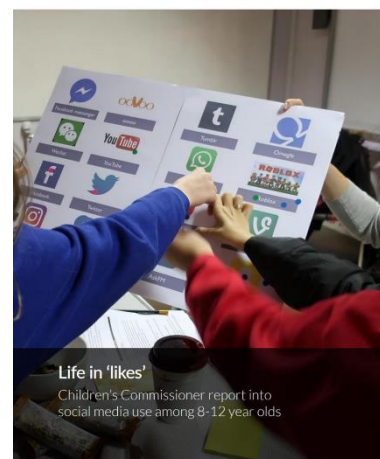
This report published on the 4th January is an interesting read and comes with three main challenges for educators:

Broaden digital literacy education beyond safety messages, to develop children’s critical awareness and resilience and understanding of algorithms, focusing on the transition stage from primary to secondary school.

Improve teachers’ knowledge about the impacts of social media on children’s wellbeing and encourage peer-to-peer learning.

Inform parents about the ways in which children’s social media use changes with age, particularly on entry to secondary school, and help them support children to use social media in a positive way, and to disengage from it.

Parenting Digital Natives – Concerns and Solutions

Published on the 11th January by internetmatters.org

This research report looks into what parents of children aged 4-16 think and feel about their children's online lives and provides insight into the concerns parents have and what further help they need.

The four top areas:

1. Parents want to understand what parental controls do and how to use them
2. Language and tone to adopt when speaking to own children
3. A clear destination for online safety information
4. Greater support from schools to reinforce the messages



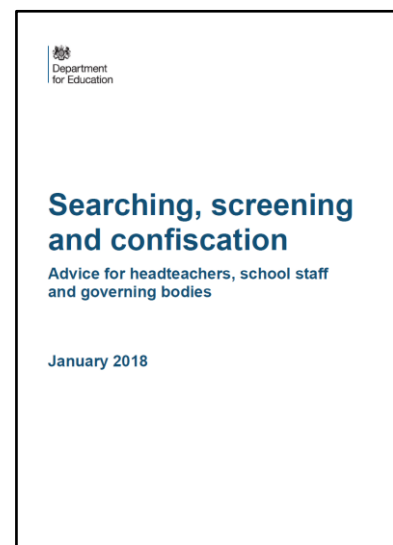

New study shows 'selfitis' (obsessive selfie-taking) appears to be real

'Selfitis' – the obsessive taking of selfies on mobile phones – appears to be a real condition according to a new study.

Researchers at Nottingham Trent University and the Thiagarajar School of Management in India began investigating the phenomenon after a hoax story appeared in the media in 2014

claiming 'selfitis' had been classed as a genuine mental disorder by the American Psychiatric Association.

They have now confirmed its existence and developed the 'Selfitis Behaviour Scale' which can be used to assess its severity.

Prohibition Orders

Please make sure that your staff behaviour policy/code of conduct includes acceptable use of technologies, staff/pupil relationships and communications, including the use of social media (Keeping Children Safe in Education, paragraph 48)...

DfE Prohibition Orders issued to teachers related to the misuse of social media/technology in 2017 came to a staggering **73!** (That's 11 more than in 2016)

Already in 2018, of the 6 Prohibition Orders issued for all offences, **5** involve the misuse of social media/technology.
